## MISCELLANY.

### Another Shipwreck.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Dec. 29.

The following details have been  
received of the loss of the steam-  
ship Emily B. Souder, from New  
York, Dec. 8, for San Domingo: A  
leak was discovered at 9 o'clock  
on the morning of the 10th inst.,  
and the deck-load was thrown  
overboard. At 11 o'clock the crew  
began throwing overboard the car-  
go in the hold. At 5 o'clock in the  
evening the wind was blowing a  
half hurricane, and saving the ves-  
sel became impossible. Four boats  
were got out, but one of them was  
found to be useless. The first  
boat, containing the first mate,  
John Christian, George Scan, and  
five passengers, was swamped  
alongside. The second boat, in  
which were Engineer Booth, two  
of the crew, one baby, and several  
passengers, drifted away. The  
third boat, containing the purser  
and others, also drifted clear. At  
10 o'clock, a life-raft was construct-  
ed, and the Captain, chief engineer,  
second mate, and two passengers  
left the vessel on it. Of the six  
persons remaining, Theodore Stin-  
ert, O. A. Anderson, and one pas-  
senger left on a floating hatch,  
leaving two cooks and one passen-  
ger, whom it was impossible to  
help, as the steamer disappeared  
three minutes afterwards. At day-  
break on the 11th Stinert and An-  
derson were alone. No boats or  
bodies were in sight; nothing but  
floating cargo. The two men were  
rescued at 5 o'clock in the evening  
by a schooner bound for Jamaica.

## MISCELLANY

Miners in Revolt

POTTSVILLE, Penn., Jan. 25.

The situation at the mines looks  
more alarming now than it has at  
any time since the long strike of  
1875. No more collieries have  
struck since those reported yester-  
day, but there are many threats  
made, and an uneasy feeling is ob-  
servable everywhere. The Read-  
ing Company's men threaten to  
strike for their wages, which are  
two months in arrears. Some of  
the miners employed by individual  
operators in the Shamokin region  
are out because of a proposed re-  
duction of wages, and it seems  
that a strike is threatened in the  
Luzerne region, but for what ob-  
ject is not known.

The real cause, however, is to be  
found in the secret organization  
known as the "Knights of Labor,"  
which has been trying for nearly a  
year to foment a disturbance, and  
it is intimated now that a general  
strike, to involve the whole anthra-  
cite coal field, is imminent. At  
the meeting of miners held at Girard  
ville on Thursday night, it was re-  
solved "that it was necessary, for  
the protection of those working in  
the anthracite coal region, that  
they combine throughout the whole  
anthracite coal field, and act to-  
gether for mutual benefit," and  
also, "that the hand of fellowship  
that has been extended by the men  
of Luzerne County be accepted  
and that measures be taken for in-  
telligent co-operation." The officers  
of the Reading Company say that  
they do not think that the strike in  
the Girardville district will extend  
any further. They expect to finish  
paying November wages at the col-  
lieries by next Saturday, and will  
then immediately begin paying  
December wages. It is feared,  
however, that next week will  
bring further trouble.—N. Y.  
Times.
